
#### AAVS BASEL – ART BASEL

### The Materiality of Art Fairs

#### 13-23 June 2023

## DESCRIPTION

**Brief:** One of the major commonalities of international art fairs like Art Basel, Frieze London, and The Armory Show in New York, is the gigantic mobilization of materials and bodies that, from disparate parts of the globe, travel to aggregate in one place (for a week or so) before moving on to a new destination. It's an endless cycle of assembling and disassembling the material and the social components that constitute them. Through the lens of materiality, by which these events unfold, this summer school will take a critical look at world fairs, expos, biennials and triennials, and the works of artists, architects, urbanists, curators, and institutions involved in them. This will be done according to a double register of materialism: one inspired by theories and methodologies of the material turn in the social sciences, and the other one inscribed into the market logics of material consumption and accumulation that foreground phenomena of extractive capitalism and exclusionary urbanism. On the occasion of Art Basel 2023, the summer school will provide the students with visitor passes and guided tours of the exhibitions and will ask them to identify and visualize under-observed social and urban phenomena linked to the fair. After the visits, the students will be challenged to reimagine the art fair through project-based urban interventions that

hinge on the material artifacts that constitute them—from artworks to publications, exhibition spaces, museum buildings, and the cities that host them.

**Format:** The summer school will be hosted at the University of Basel, Urban Studies division, and will consist of 2 days of intensive seminars and tutorials (readings, discussions, and frontal lectures), 3 days of field research and interpretation of data (including guided tours at Art Basel), and 5 days for the preparation of the final work (texts, drawings, printed and physical works, and presentations). During the seminar, the students will address a variety of critical and theoretical literature and relevant research work by artists, architects, urbanists, scholars, and curators. Tutors will provide the students with short tutorials on investigative research, drawing techniques, photography, filmmaking, storytelling, and public speaking. The seminar will serve as a forum to discuss students' interests and ideas, and for planning the field research through which they will document and analyze "the materiality of art fairs." As a final work, the students will focus on creating and delivering proposals that forge critical urban interventions by mobilizing the material dimensions of the art fairs.

**Outcome:** The final work deliverables will take the form of print-based visualizations, publication mock-ups, exhibition concepts, artworks, short films, or a combination of them. Regardless of format, the final work should contain evidence of substantial and original research conducted during the summer school, and a physical component that can be exhibited or deployed during an art fair. Students will work in groups under the supervision of tutors in a supportive workshop environment that will hone in on each participant's research agenda and approach to "the materiality of art fairs." The course aims at providing theoretical foundations and qualitative tools of research, analysis, and representation to identify and document complex material trajectories in the city as well as to interpret and narrativize them into project-based interventions. Final works will be publicly presented.

## BIOGRAPHIES

#### Programme Head

**Fabrizio Furiassi** is an architect, scholar and educator from Rome, based in New York and Basel. He teaches architectural history/theory and design studio at The New School, Parsons School of Design, and material investigations at the University of Basel, Urban Studies division, where he is pursuing doctoral studies in architectural and urban history. Furiassi holds master's degrees from Columbia University GSAPP and La Sapienza University of Rome. He also studied at the Moscow Architectural Institute, and was a research fellow at the Strelka Institute for Media, Architecture and Design. His current research exposes the relations between urban transformations and material flows, using theories and methodologies from the social sciences, to centralize the agency of construction materials in historical change. Besides academia, he has over ten years of experience at cutting-edge architecture firms and cultural institutions in Europe, Asia, and North America. Fabrizio is the founder and co-director of Distributed Architecture, a New York-based practice versed in urban research and participatory design initiatives that connect and strengthen communities, with

ongoing projects in NYC's public housing. At the AA, Fabrizio is programme head at the visiting school in Basel, and co-leads a unit at the visiting school in Seoul.

*Vinicio Altmann* is an MA student at the University of Basel, Urban Studies division. Prior to that, she served as spatial designer at Tasmeem Biennial 2022/ Radical Futures and collaborated with several institutions such as the London School of Economics, Birzeit University, Al Marsad, and the Arab Human Rights Center in Golan Heights. Jumanah is a graduate of the American University of Sharjah and the MS Critical, Conceptual & Curatorial Practices program at Columbia University GSAPP.

**Aleksandra Budaeva** is an architect and teaches at TU Wien, research unit "Gestaltungslehre und Entwerfen."
